## Introduction to the transcriptions of census data for the Cleobury Mortimer area

The first full census was in 1841 and they have been taken every 10 years since then. The information is kept confidential for 100 years. Thus they are available from 1841 to 1911.

In the first census only limited information was recorded but subsequent censuses have recorded more. Unfortunately some of the enumerators, especially in the earlier years, had pretty poor handwriting, so some of the transcribed data cannot be guaranteed. Moreover the civil servants who harvested the data from the census sheets appear to have thought that no one after them would have any interest in looking at them. They ticked off the data, crossed out and added stuff about which they had no real knowledge, making some of it illegible.

It is worth noting that in 1839 37% of men and 50 % of women were unable to sign their marriage register. It seems that generally the enumerator merely wrote down what he had heard in his own version of spelling. Even in 1911 quite a number of Heads of Household had to get a neighbour or the enumerator to fill in the form them

Another thing which should be considered is that the information on the census sheets is not necessarily the **truth**. People may well have lied about their age or their relationship to other members of the household. Some of the enumerators were extremely pious and respondents may have been embarrassed about revealing details of their private life. Illegitimacy was often hidden or, in some cases of a particularly difficult enumerator, heavily underlined. There was nothing in any of the instructions to use "single mother" as a description but some insisted on using it. So their loss of privacy is our gain in the information available.

The columns from left to right in this transcribed version are (apart from 1841 which is far less comprehensive and where right hand col. is answer to "Were you born in this county?"):

- 1. running total which corresponds with the data in the COMPLETE INDEX .It covers all 20 parishes (There are over 70,000 entries. It's available from me or from the CM History Soc. see below).
- 2. Number in the record
- 3. Christian name
- 4. surname
- 5. Relationship to head of house (see abbreviations below)
- 6. Age
- 7. Male or Female
- 8. Condition as to marriage (Married, Single, Widowed)
- 9. Only in 1911. Years married
- 10. Occupation
- 11. Birthplace

The original census sheets can be viewed (for a payment) at www.ancestry.co.uk. This involves either buying credits for small tasks or an annual sub of about £120 which allows you to search all the UK censuses and quite a lot of parish and other records. You can also access this for free in the library.

For the purpose of the census, Neen Sollars/Milson, Farlow/Silvington and Wheathill/Loughton were treated a one parish. But *Ancestry* have split them into two. I have re-amalgamated them to make them more like the originals
